Name: U21 Global Citizenship

Course dates: 5th -23rd October 2020

Application dates: Direct applications to U21 are open from September 2 - 30, 2020, 5pm (BST).

Cost: No cost to students, U21 is covering the full cost of this opportunity.

Who is eligible: Any registered student of a U21 institution (University of Delhi is a member institution) – this can be foundation student, undergraduate or postgraduate. Applications from anyone aged under 18 will not be accepted.

What does the course involve:

Overview of course:

- 3 weeks on online learning and engagement with students across the globe.
- A minimum of **3 hours of learning each week** that students can undertake at a time that suits them via the U21 Global Citizenship online portal.
- An additional live reflective session each week via video conference. Facilitated by Common
 Purpose theses session will consolidate learning and be an opportunity to interact with other
 participants in real time. Theses session will be offered twice each week to offer viable options
 in every time zone represented.
- Students undertake a number of modules each week on **key topics related to the UN Sustainable Development Goals and open source leadership**.
- Engagement is key to the course. Students will not be able to progress to the next week without completing certain activities which involve direct engagement with course material and other participants. As well as taking part in cohort discussion forums, analysing insights from global leaders via videos and articles and partaking in quizzes, participants are also given opportunities to work in small groups asynchronously on topics of interest to them. Offline activities are also provided for participants to deepen their learning independently. Through the online platform students are able to have 1:1 conversations with other participants via the chat function allowing further opportunities to engage and connect with students around the world. Each week's content will only be made available at the start of that week so students will progress through the course as a cohort.
- In order to gain the micro-credential students will need to complete two end of programme assignments that will be submitted to Common Purpose for assessment.

Outcomes of participation: Following a recent programme, students gave the following average scores (on a scale of 1-6) when asked if – as a result of participating in Global Citizenship – they felt better prepared to:

- lead change at speed in their life and the world − 5.05
- collaborate across diverse networks 5.20
- challenge their preconceptions to solve complex problems 5.18
- operate across hierarchies 5.20
- build trust and maintain integrity with others 5.18

Those who pass the final assessment will also be awarded the U21/Common Purpose **Global Citizenship micro-credential** and have access to the Common Purpose Alumni opportunities.
